

Imagine a place where each tree tells a story, every breeze carries a whisper of the past, and the sky changes chapters with the time of day. This isn't a scene from a fantasy novel - it's Wilcox Park. Our beloved refuge in downtown Westerly is a nationally significant historic park and arboretum - nature's library: a living, breathing collection open to all who wander with curiosity.

Just like Westerly Library, Wilcox Park is full of knowledge. The rustle of leaves reveals lessons in patience and resilience. Petals on

flowers mirror nature's exquisite design language. Birds chirp, insects hum, clouds drift—offering endless opportunities for observation and reflection.

In this library, you don't need a card, just invitations to slow down, listen, and learn. We invite you to Wilcox Park to have a small picnic beneath leafy canopies, follow squirrel tracks like punctuation across the earth, or tuck into a book as bees browse their own floral chapters nearby.

Libraries and nature have more in common than you might think: both are sanctuaries of discovery. And when the two come together - say, for a story time beneath a Champion Tree or a scavenger hunt amongst the plants, they create nature-smart spaces that blend learning, wellness, and community connection in powerful ways. And if you are looking to level up your knowledge of Wilcox Park, consider taking one of the free "Native Flowers and Trees" or "Specimen Trees" walking tours of Wilcox Park.

Speaking of leveling up, this summer we encourage everyone to sign up to participate in our summer reading program, "Level Up at Your Library". "Level up" originates from video games, where it means to advance to a higher level and gain new skills, strengths, or abilities. But it's also used to mean improving yourself or something - whether it's your health, relationships, or plant identification knowledge. It's all about growth, progress, and stepping up your game.

So, grab your library card - it's more powerful beyond your imagination. Whether you're leveling up your reading, your skills, or your connection to community, there's no better time to press start with Westerly Library & Wilcox Park. Game on.




in the vault

June has been very active for our Special Collections! Summer is always our busiest time of year. We have been asked to research the history of two Westerly elementary schools — State Street and Tower Street.

We've also been digitizing some historic photos of Christ Episcopal Church on the corner of Broad and Elm Streets here in Westerly, and we have had visitors from Seattle and Colorado come in to research their Westerly roots. Now we are helping a man with Westerly ancestors determine which if any of his relatives fought in the Revolutionary War.

This interesting building was the Westerly Armory. It was located on Main Street, approximately where McQuade's Marketplace is today. The house you can see in the back, between the Armory building and the parsonage on the right, is 20 Elm Street. At that time, it was occupied by members of the Cottrell family, and now it is the Masonic Temple. The armory burned down in 1898 and eventually was rebuilt in its current location, at the corner of Dixon Street and Railroad Avenue.

Shaping the Future of Senior Housing | Tuesday, July 1st, 9:30 am-3:30 pm



All of the leadership positions and exhibition activities are performed by volunteers dedicated to the preservation of this organization and the values it represents. In keeping with our long standing tradition we hold yearly exhibitions which are open competitions. All artists are encouraged to enter their work.


As the summer heat and humidity begin to settle in, why not beat the heat with some cool graphic novels?




