My wish is that you will devour this magazine cover to cover but if you only jump right over to the monthly programs, I hope you are able to discover something new to spark your curiosity.



There are more than just books for you in Adult Services. We have two small private study rooms that you can reserve for up to 3 hours. We recommend reserving them ahead of time, as they are very popular and often booked. Interested in gardening? Come explore our Seed Library and a Plant Cutting Library. The Seed Library has a selection of various types of vegetables and flowers that you can choose from, while the Plant Cutting Library has donated cuttings that are ready for potting.



Additionally, we have a collection of jigsaw puzzles, perfect for relaxing activities on rainy days. History enthusiasts might be interested in the Westerly Sun microfilm collection we have. Although we are working to have the complete paper digitized, 1950-current are available on microfilm. We have also started developing a world languages collection that currently has mostly Spanish language titles. Continue to check back for additional languages and titles in the future.

The Adult Services staff is available by phone and email to help answer any research questions you have. If you are searching for your next great read, please contact us or stop by the Reference Desk for assistance.

databases

You may already know that there are many databases available through askri.org and our consortium (OSLRI). In addition to those, did you know that our library subscribes to some databases that are exclusively for you, our patrons? It's easy to access these databases by going to westerlylibrary.org and clicking Online Resources and then Databases where you can see all the databases we have available!

To access the New York Times from home, choose New York Times (All Access) from our list of databases. From there you will need to log in or create an account to use the promotional code that gives you 24 hours of free access to NY Times online. With this redemption code, you will get access to all the News, Wirecutter, Cooking, The Athletic, and the Adult Services Department's favorite of all, Games!

Comics Plus offers access to thousands of digital comics, manga, and picture books. Best of all there is never any wait list or borrowing limit! With Kanopy and your library card, you can stream 30,000 films without ads along with television series and kids programming.

America's News provides access to current and archived content from more than 2,000 newspaper titles, as well as newswires, transcripts, business journals, periodicals, government documents and other publications. Best of all it includes The Westerly Sun from 2000 to present as well as the Providence Journal!





Solomon is a writer and director in both theatre and film. His short film, Brenda & Billy (and the Pothos Plant) premiered at Tribeca Film Festival and played over 20 festivals. He also directed the short film Cavan and wrote and directed the award-winning Photo Op (starring Randy Harrison) that played over twenty-five festivals including Palm Springs ShortFest and Outfest.

Solomon assisted Oscar-winning writer/director Bill Condon on the films Mr. Holmes and Disney's Beauty and the Beast. He also served as Condon's associate on the revised production of Side Show on Broadway and was an Associate Producer on "A Christmas Story Live" for Fox. He has been an Associate Director to Joe Mantello and Scott Ellis and has worked on sixteen Broadway productions including Elf, Tootsie, The Mystery of Edwin Drood, 9 to 5, Sunday in the Park

with George, Curtains and Assassins. He directed the first national tour of Tootsie and the Japanese premiere production produced by TOHO Theatricals. He is currently directing and developing the new musical Pump up the Volume (based on the 1990 film) as well as his horror feature, Chesterfield Falls. His play Margaret and Craig was seen at New York Stage and Film (starring Mario Cantone, "Sex and the City") and is also in development for future production. He is currently at work on three new feature film scripts. Solomon is a graduate of Vassar College and has also been an educator, instructor or guest artist at various acting studios and institutions including Michigan State University, Point Park University, Sheridan College, New York Film Academy, The Growing Studio and Actors Therapy.

Did you know that libraries circulate more than just books and movies?

We certainly do!

Come on in and take a look at our UPDATED Library of Things! Simply walk past the Circulation Desk and you will see a wall of colored acrylic plaques advertising what we have to offer!

And WHAT do we offer, you might ask?

We circulate THINGS for the outdoors, THINGS for the indoors, THINGS for projects, and THINGS that are for play. Feel free to go to our catalog online (https://westerlylibrary.oslri.net/) and type in Westerly Library of Things to get a full listing of THINGS. And, you don't want to miss our newest reel on social media highlighting our staff's musical skills playing some of the new instruments in our Library of Things collection!

But, how do I check a THING out? How does it work?



Well dear reader, simply take one (or two) plaques of THINGS of your choosing from the Library of Things wall and bring them to the Circulation Desk where one of our lovely staff can assist you. You can take your item(s) home for 1 week after you sign our updated Non-Traditional Materials Borrowing Policy, which outlines the rules and expectations of borrowing.

After that, we scan the document for our records, you keep a copy of the policy, and we check out the "THING" and you take it home! Easy!

And with that, we hope you enjoy the THINGS we have to offer!

This pass offers FREE admission for 2 guests. The Audrain Automobile Museum is also a member of the North American Reciprocal Museum Association (NARM) thus allowing members to get discounts at member museums (such as the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum and more).



This pass offers FREE admission for 2 adults and 2 children under 18.



This pass offers 4 FREE regular price admission tickets (up to 2 adults). It also offers 10% off at the museum shop and café.



This pass entitles up to two adults and three youth/children (ages 4-17, under 4 are free) 50% off full price admission to Mystic Seaport Museum on the day printed on the card.



This pass allows 50% off admission to The Breakers for up to 2 adults (13+) and 4 children (6-12). Children under 6 are free. Valid for regular daytime admission and cannot be applied to multi-house tickets.

Parkenhancement

For any of you that have frequented the park for an invigorating stroll or respite from life's stresses, you would not have been able to miss the park's newest feature. A stone retaining wall has been meticulously built along the bottom of the slope adjacent to our historic bandstand. It runs 300-feet long and is approximately 21 inches tall.

The benefit of this new retaining wall is threefold; it creates a level shoulder adjacent to the park walkway, it retains the slope behind it allowing for future landscaping, and it provides for a sturdy perch to rest oneself.

In order to gain approval from the RI Historic Preservation and Heritage Commission, two review meetings were attended. The project renderings were shared and questions were answered in the successful attempt to get their endorsement. New England field stone comprises the body of the wall and reclaimed hand-cut granite slabs are utilized as capstones. Together this creates a sturdy entity that will be able to persist for the ages.

Dower Stone of Hope Valley was commissioned to build the wall with funds from a generous donor wishing to remain unanimous. Park staff excavated the site, installed the base and filter fabric and are completing the project with additional crushed stone behind it for drainage. In the spring, sod will be laid on the new level shoulder allowing for patrons to step off the walk when pedestrian traffic gets clustered.









Leaf mold compost makes for an excellent planting mix for new plantings as well as a rich top dressing for existing plantings while at the same time greatly increasing the soils' ability to retain moisture. In order to maintain the open grassy lawns of the park, the vast majority of the leaves are collected and removed. We pile them up and allow them to compost down through natural processes. Our storage areas for this are at capacity this year so the park's leaves are being donated to the Westerly Land Trust at the Barlow Nature Preserve.

Katie Orsi and Maura Francis, Geraldine's two daughters, contacted us wishing to dedicate a tree in the park honoring Gerry's 90th birthday. Maura and Katie informed us that red is Gerry's favorite color. The 'Scarlet Fire' Kousa dogwood has bright red blooms, and all dogwood trees have four-sepaled flowers that historically have been representative of the crucifix, evident on old Christian headstones in cemeteries. Gerry's daughters felt like this tree selection was a perfect choice for their mother. The tree also serves as a memorial to their late father, Robert Spillane. This memorial can be located across the walkway from the Bandstand on the hill. The tree was dedicated on November 25, 2024.
