The Power of a Library Card

Every September, libraries nationwide celebrate Library Card Sign-Up Month, a campaign launched by the American Library Association (ALA) in 1987 to coincide with the back-to-school season. This is a perfect reminder to students, parents, and lifelong learners that a library card is one of the most powerful school supplies of all.

In an age of digital overload and rising costs, remember that some of the best things in life really are free. Yes, your humble library card is a quiet superhero. This small but mighty card is absolutely free and packed with perks that go far beyond borrowing books. Whether you're a student, a parent, a professional, or just a curious soul, having a library card is essential as it serves as your passport to knowledge, creativity, and connection.

With a library card, you unlock access to thousands upon thousands of books, e-books, audiobooks, magazines, newspapers, movies, music, and even video games. Your Westerly Library & Wilcox Park library card also gains you access to streaming movies and documentaries via platforms like Kanopy and Hoopla, all access to the New York Times online, Consumer Reports online, museum and experience passes, and over one hundred Library of Things items.

Your library card serves as your gateway to everything else the library and park have to offer including online courses from coding to photography, tutor assistance, research databases for school, work, or personal projects, local events, lectures, art exhibitions, nature, history, and social programs such as book clubs or Dungeons & Dragons, as well as volunteer opportunities.

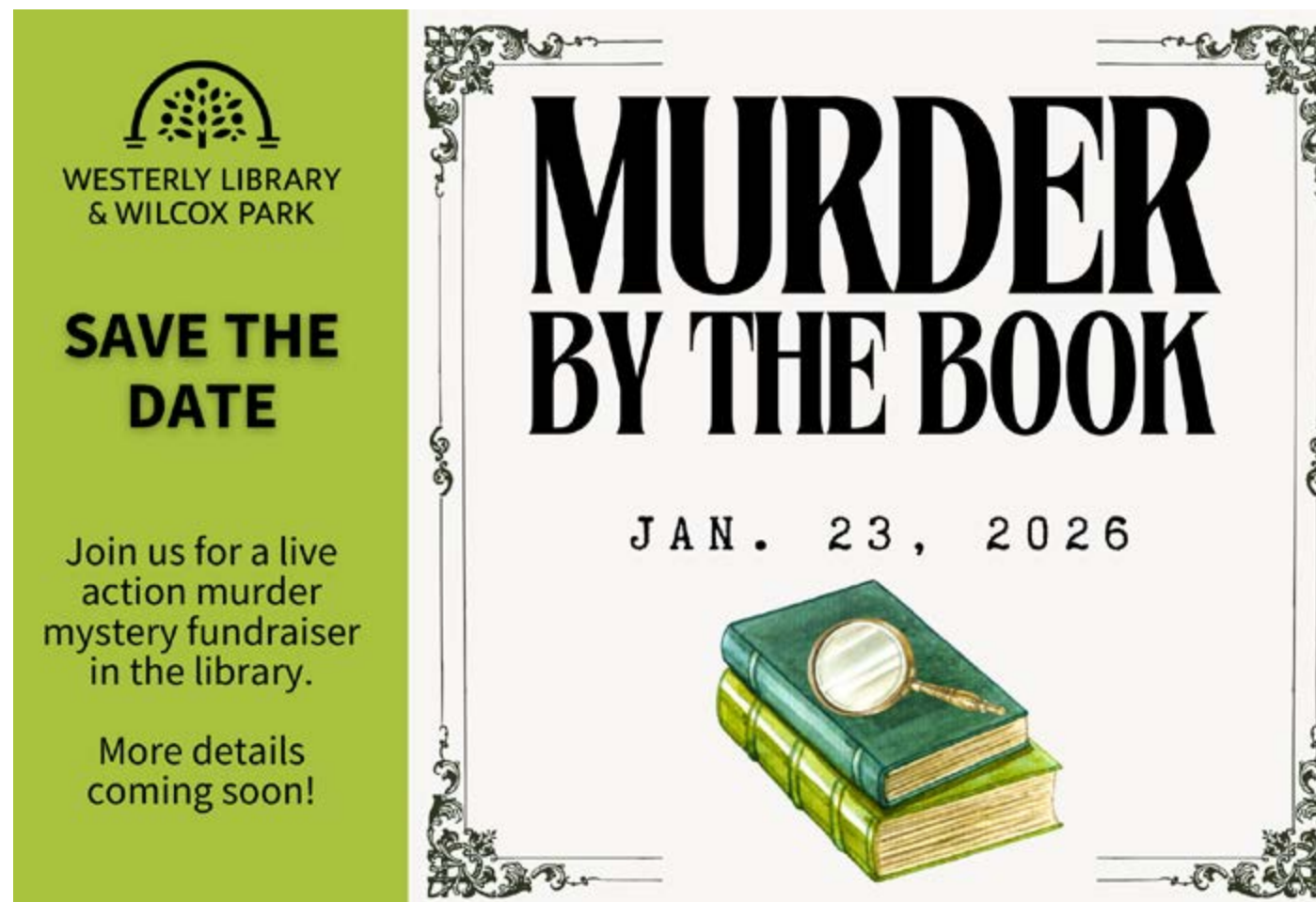

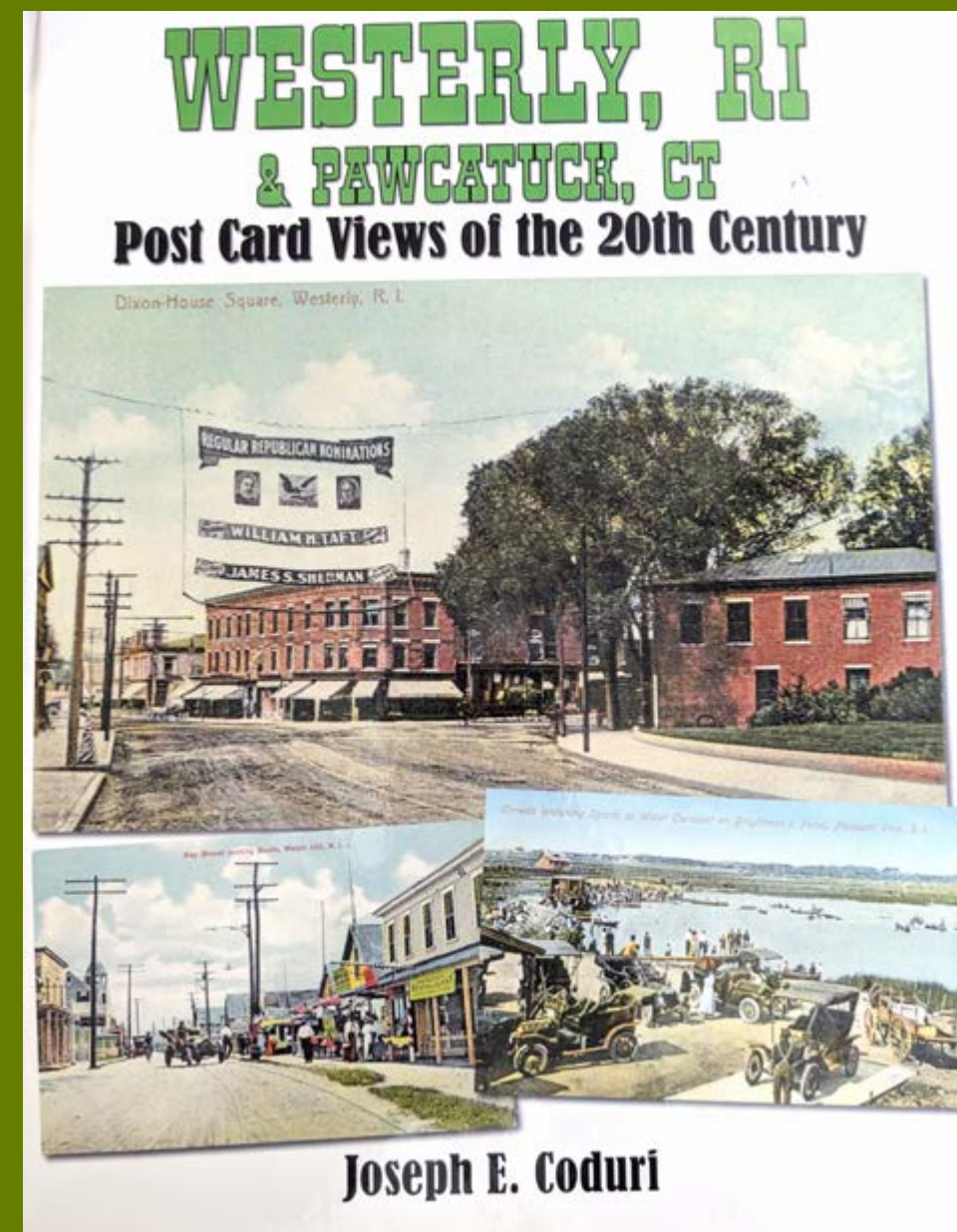


September is Library Card Sign-up Month!

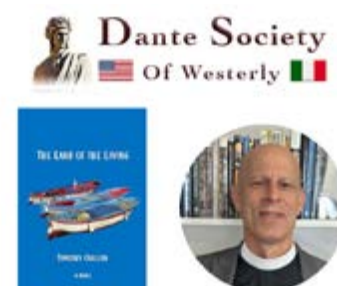

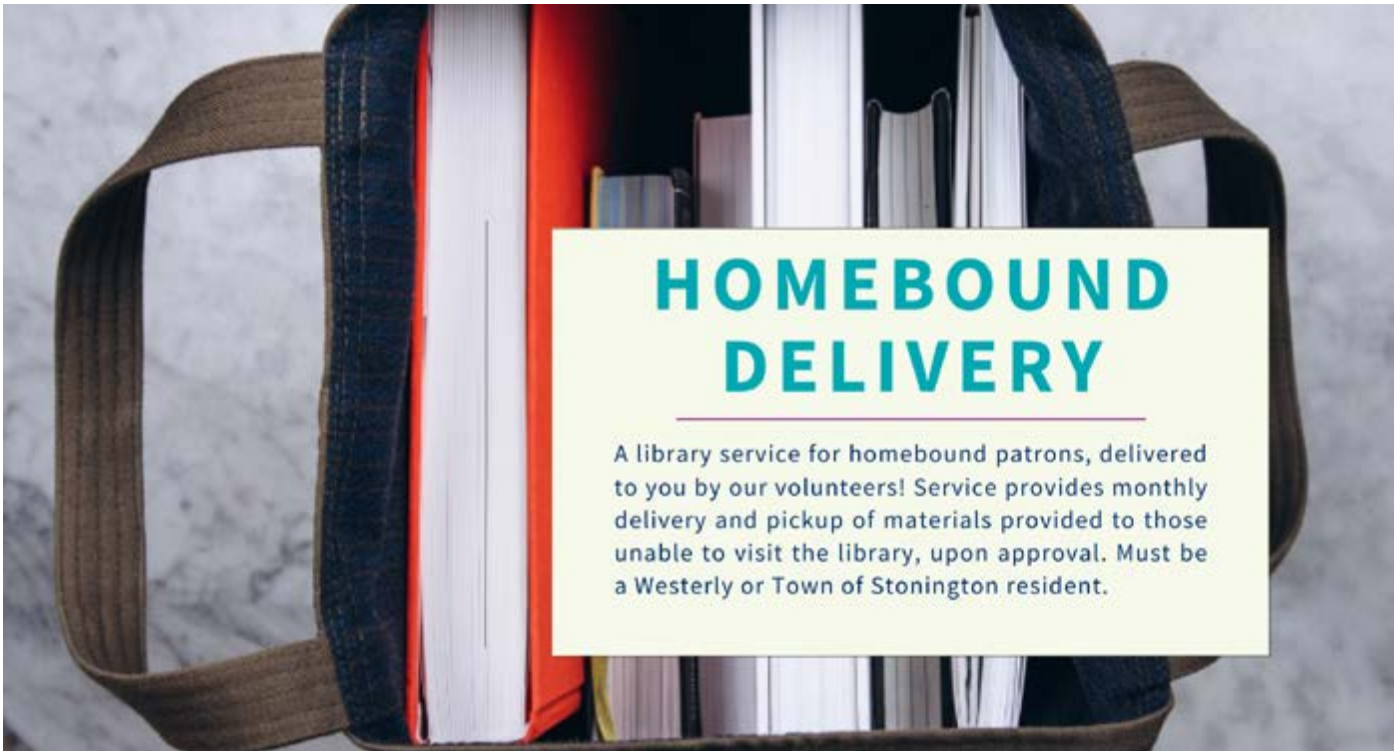

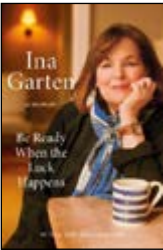
